Dear Sir,

I enclose herewith Document "Fate Accompli". It is my belief that in wisely going along with this document it can be of more advantage to you and the State of Western Australia. It is amongst other reasons for this purpose that I have written same.

I would point out that a person who is just, is never a loser. And it is in this category that I would like to see you and your Government.

If you are so inclined but concerned in respect to Political circumstances. Then firstly I can not over emphasise the 100% support and interest given by the farmers to us. Of acclaim from Soldiers in Vietnam of requests to allow Groups to handle our case and of Groups wishing for myself to lead in giving sound advice, none of which I or we are at present interested in for whilst having found ourselves in a position which posed a legal problem and as the legal quotation goes, "For every Legal Problem there is a legal answer," I gave both yourself and the Governor the answer.

I presume you may know that this case and its data has already been called for and used as lectures in State Schools.

It is proposed to publish in book form letters relative to the case as one of the many means of financing any expenses in fighting the issue if same becomes necessary.

If you are concerned as to the Labour Parties attitude to any actions on your part I took steps quite some time ago to get a written statement from Mr Tonkin for my files, which he gladly gave.

I would rather that a position of mutual co-operation were to prevail than to have to fight your Government purely for the purpose of gaining Justis Which I am determined to achieve.

I believe that you have a lot to gain by resolving the matter into one of progressing co-operation. If the matter goes into its next stage it will not be possible to achieve that which can be achieved from this point.

And by this latter sentence I most certainly am not referring there in to Court Action.

I believe that providing you are willing to go along that we would well be advised to co-operately discuss the matter in this light, and on being in agreeance, to then jointly address the Governor.

In the circumstances I feel that I can not be any more generous than I have to date to avoid embarrassment and at the same time resolve this matter.

I am quite prepared on the lines mentioned to discuss same with yourself, Mr Court or both of you with myself only.

If you have no wish to happily jointly resolve this matter then I at least have offered same.

Kindly advise me your decision.
